NEWS FROM CAMP By Bill Hartley

2001 will be remembered by each of us for many reasons. I have learned that over time we tend to remember the good things. I sincerely hope that none of you were personally effected by the events of last September. Despite the tragedy that touched so many, Camp Cherry Valley continues to move forward.

2002 will be the year that CCV begins a major transformation. In order to continue serving almost 15,000 campers each year it is necessary for the San Gabriel Valley Council to make many improvements to the facility. The cost will be significant; in fact, between

1990 and 2010, I estimate the council will have spent about 10 million dollars on CCV. Beginning in 1990 when we began year round operation, building standards and codes on Catalina were upgraded, and camper standards and expectations raised.

The final stage of this redevelopment project will begin this year. We will begin by installing the new Lighthouse this January. We will also install the water tank and water distribution system this year. After we literally replace the entire camp's underground domestic water system and install a camp-wide fire suppression system we will obtain an occupancy permit for the Camp Store and Craft Center and bring it on line.

At this point we will have the following projects to move forward on; Warehouse relocation, Trading Post remodel, Cook's housing units replacement, Waterfront improvements, and Sea Breeze Campfire site replacement.

In the meantime, we are making many improvements to the camp. Most significant is the completion of all the professional studies that have been completed on the camp property. With this information we can now make long term plans for the camp that will meet our objectives and still protect our investments and environment. Beginning this year almost half of our campers can now camp on raised deck campsites. Ongoing pier repairs will allow us to provide more campers with pier access for a longer period each year.

Program changes and improvements this year include a High Adventure program for our Summer Resident Camp and a one-week program for our Venture Scouts. Additional work will be done on our new fitness Area near the campsites.

I hope this year will bring you to camp. We would like to see you as a guest, CORE Staff member, or as a camper. Come on over if you can.

FROM THE ARCHIVES By Dave Minnihan

Our first photo is from Ron Wood and also appears on our Web page. In 1962, National Camp School's Aquatic Course was held at Cherry Valley. That's Ron Wood standing at far right.

The second photo is of the Land Ship taken in the late 1960s-early 1970s. The Land Ship was built by Skipper Robison in late 1920s or early 1930s and was originally three stories high. First floor was used for classes and storage of waterfront equipment. 2nd and 3rd floors were Waterfront Staff housing. The two top floors were torn down in late 1960s and Waterfront Staff had to move to Staff Village. Prior to campfires, the Staff would gather in the bow of the Land Ship and sing songs, then lead campers up to Sea Breeze. The Land Ship was torn down in 1974. The Sea Lab now stands in it's place.

In the background of the photo, in front of the Mine, is the old Program Office/Leaders Lounge. This was also used as the Camp Store up until the 1950s. The top floor was used as Staff Housing. It was torn down in 1973, though the steps still remain. For a couple years afterward, there was a shade structure there and they used it as the Handicraft Lodge. Now there are a couple tables and a program box and it is used for classes.

The Camp flyer is from 1923, the first year at Cherry Valley. This was the fifth Annual Training Camp for the Pasadena District Council, as the first four years were at Howland's Landing. Note the cost of \$12.50 for ten days. Wonder what that would be in 2002 dollars.
